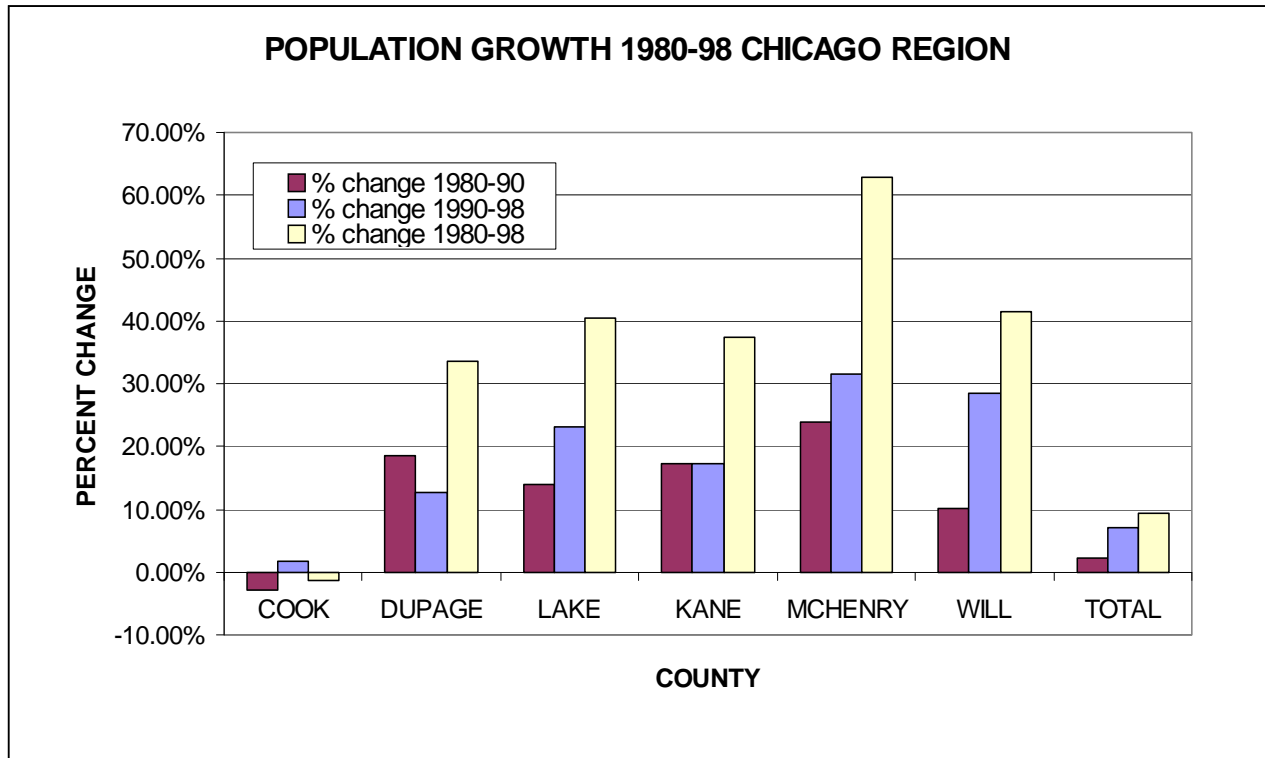

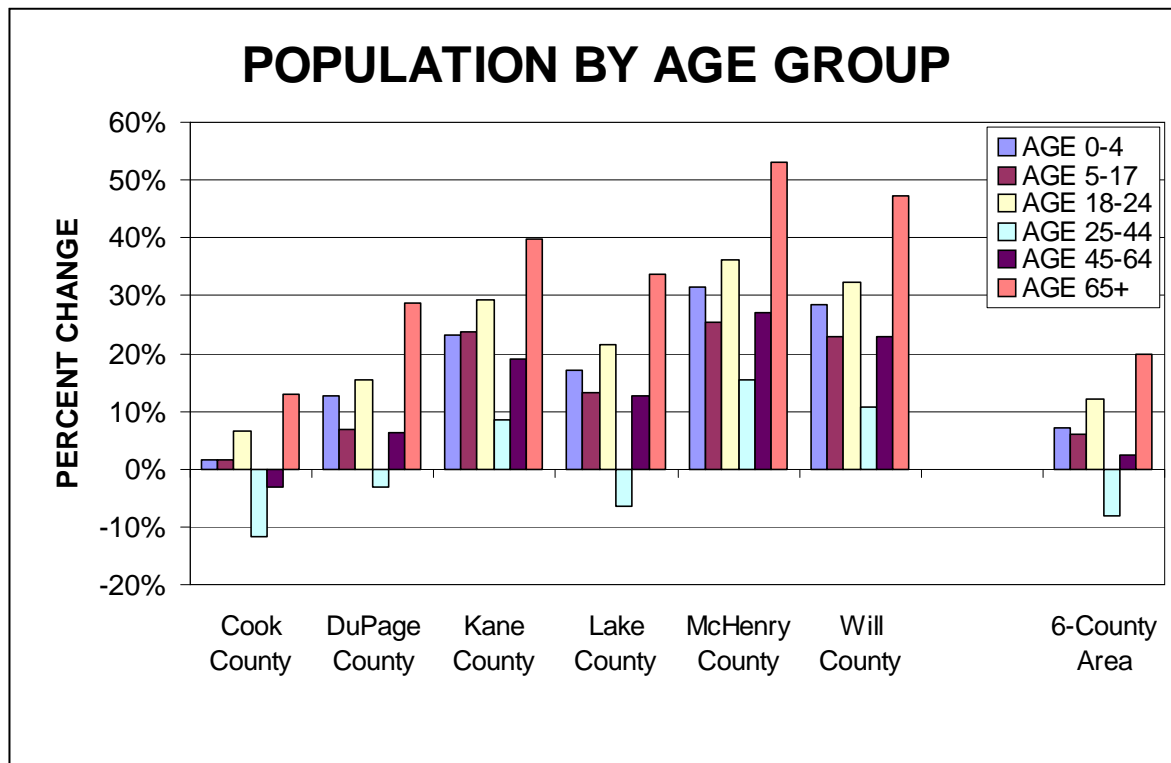

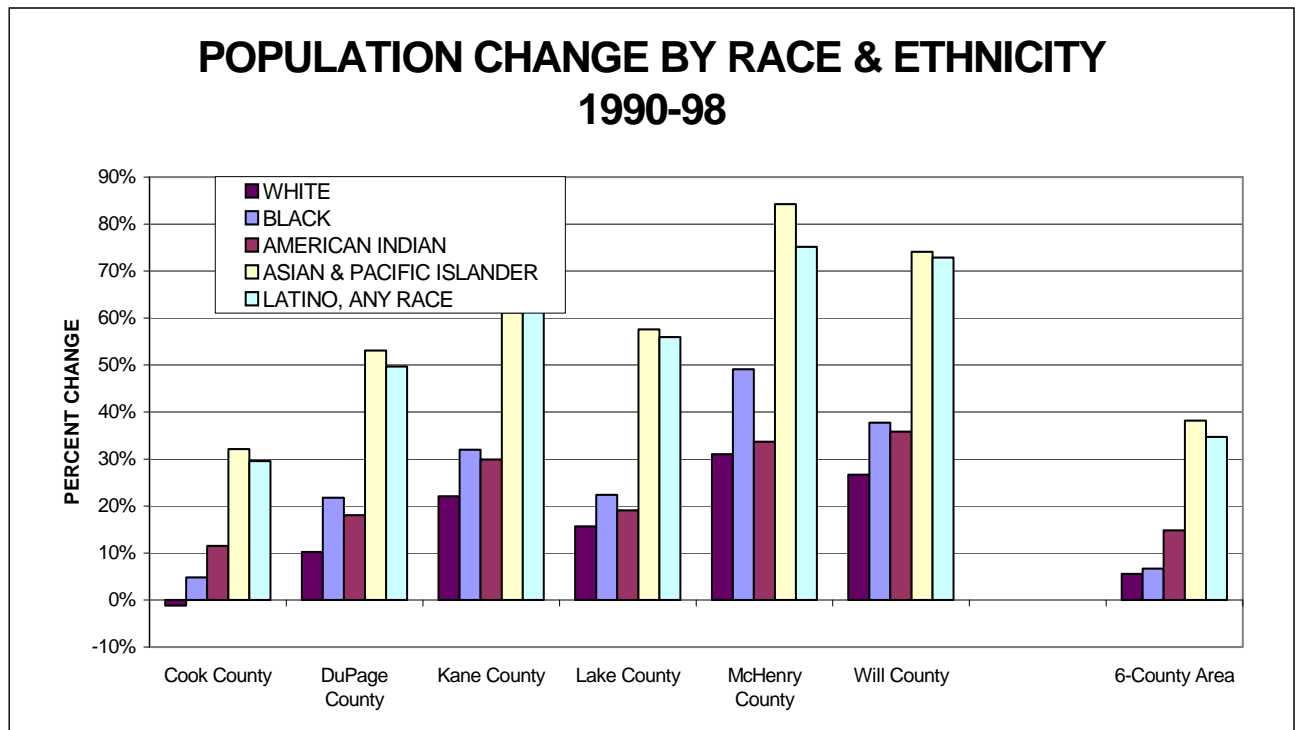
**Figure 12. Percent Change by Race/Ethnicity, 1990-1998**

**Figure 13. Percent Change in Population by Race/Ethnicity, 1990-1998**

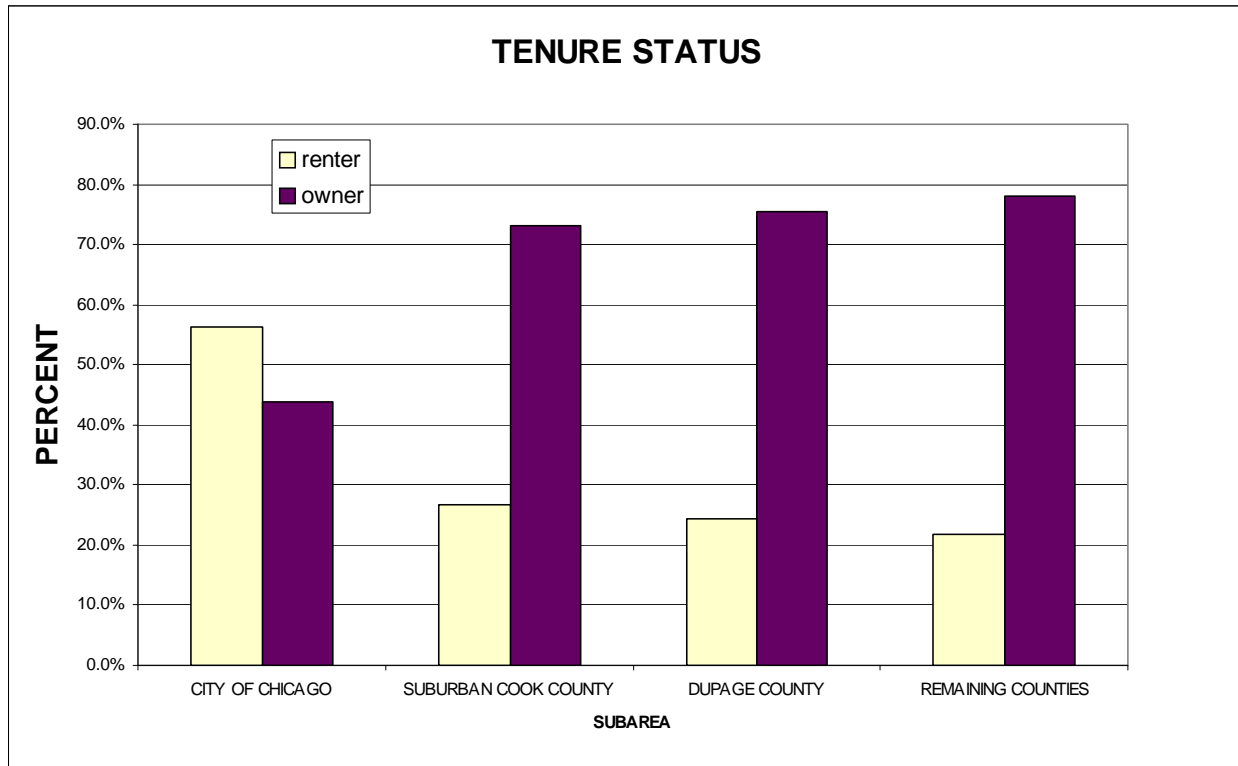


**Figure 14. Tenure status by subarea, 1995**

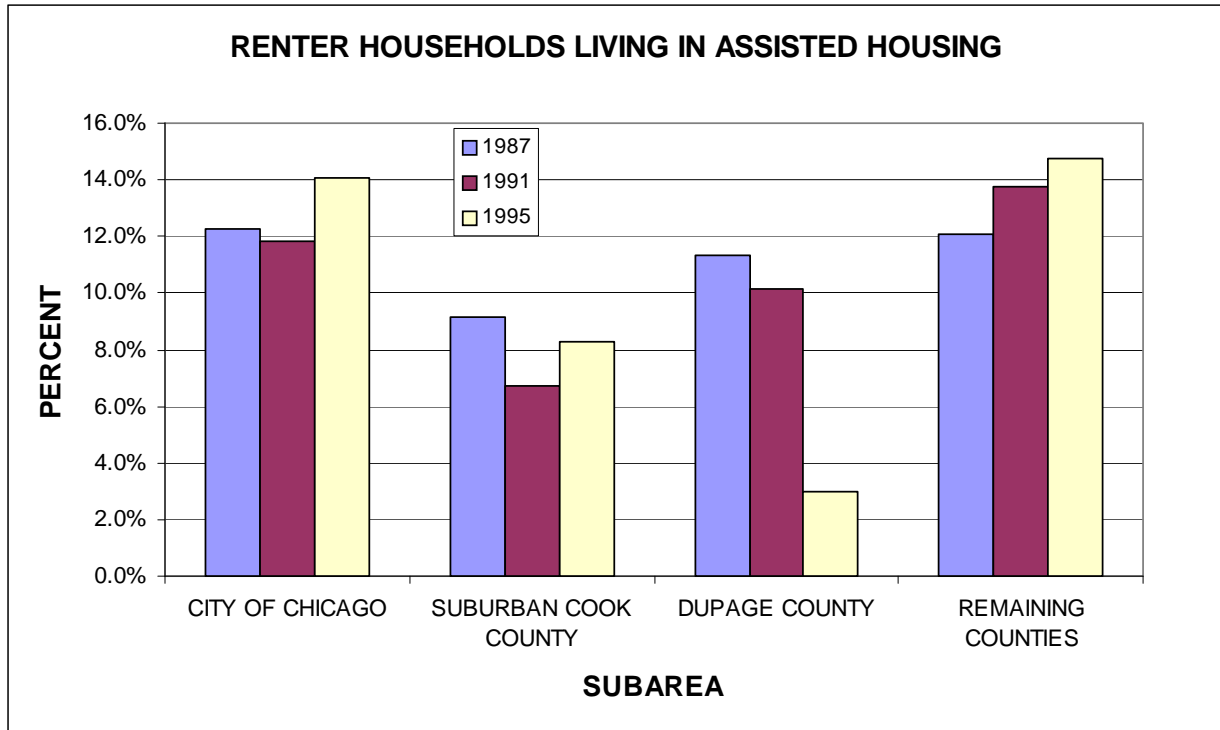
**Figure 17. Renter households living in assisted and unassisted housing by subarea, 1987-95**

**Figure 18. Proportion of renter households living in assisted housing by subarea, 1995**

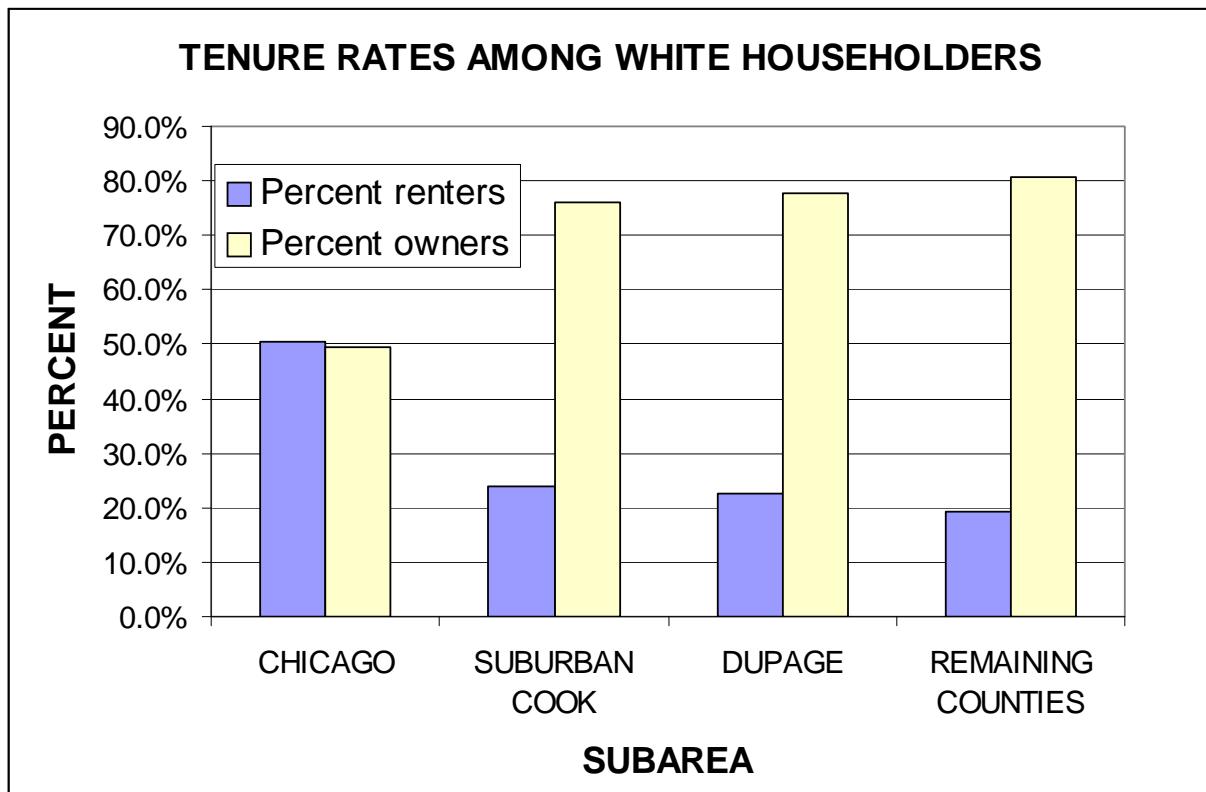


**Figure 19. Tenure rates among White householders by subarea, 1995**

**Figure 20. Proportion of White householders that rent by subarea, 1995**

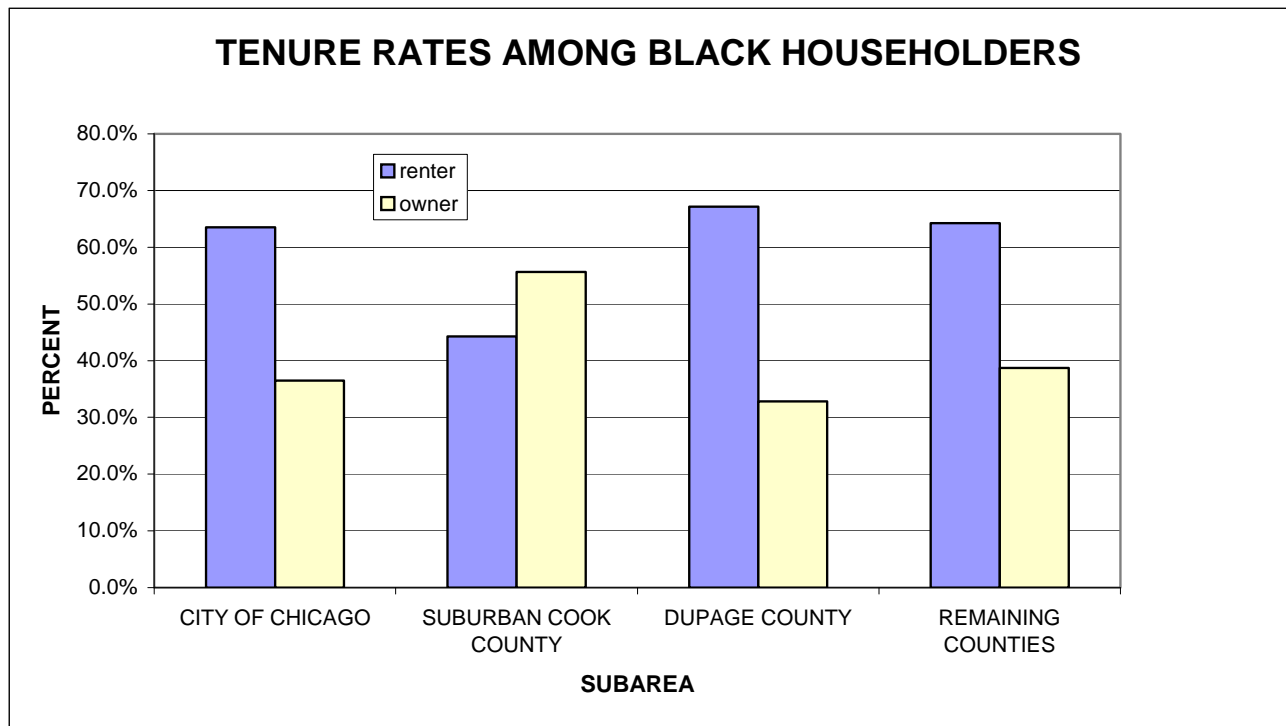


**Figure 21. Tenure rates among Black householders by subarea, 1995**

**Figure 22. Proportion of Black householders that rent by subarea, 1995**

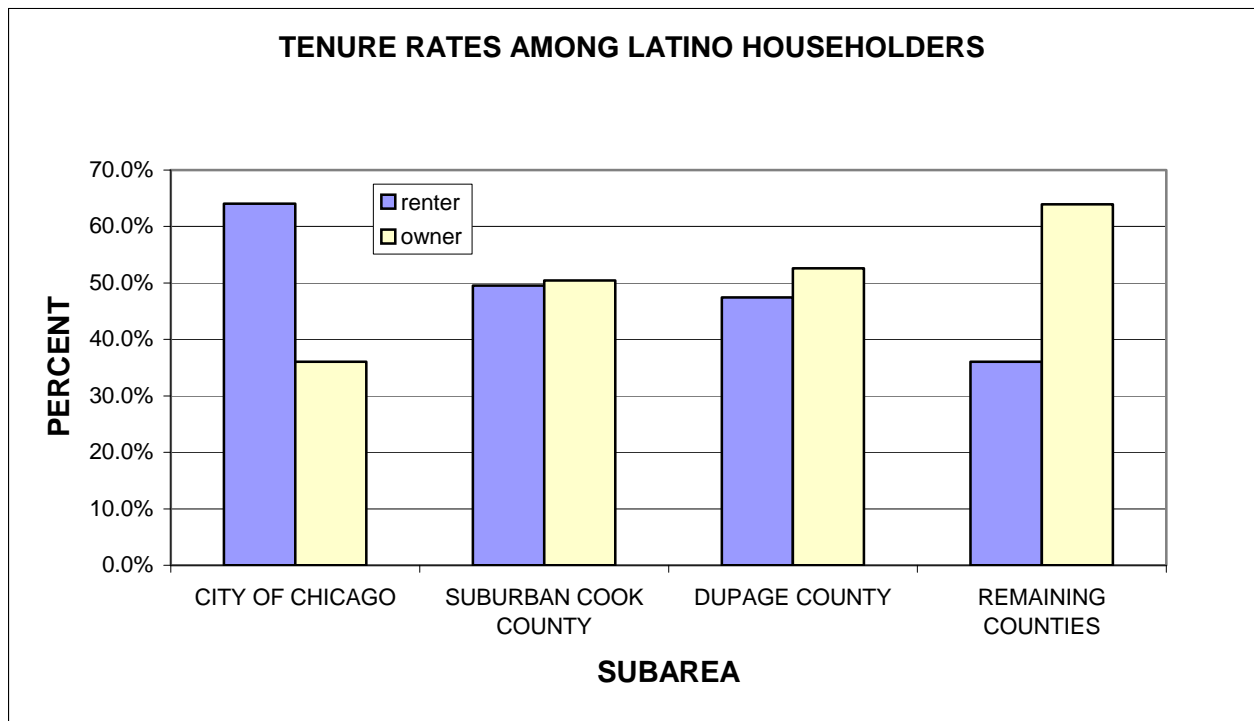


**Figure 23. Tenure rates among Latino Householders by subarea, 1995**

**Figure 24. Proportion of Latino householders that rent by subarea, 1995**

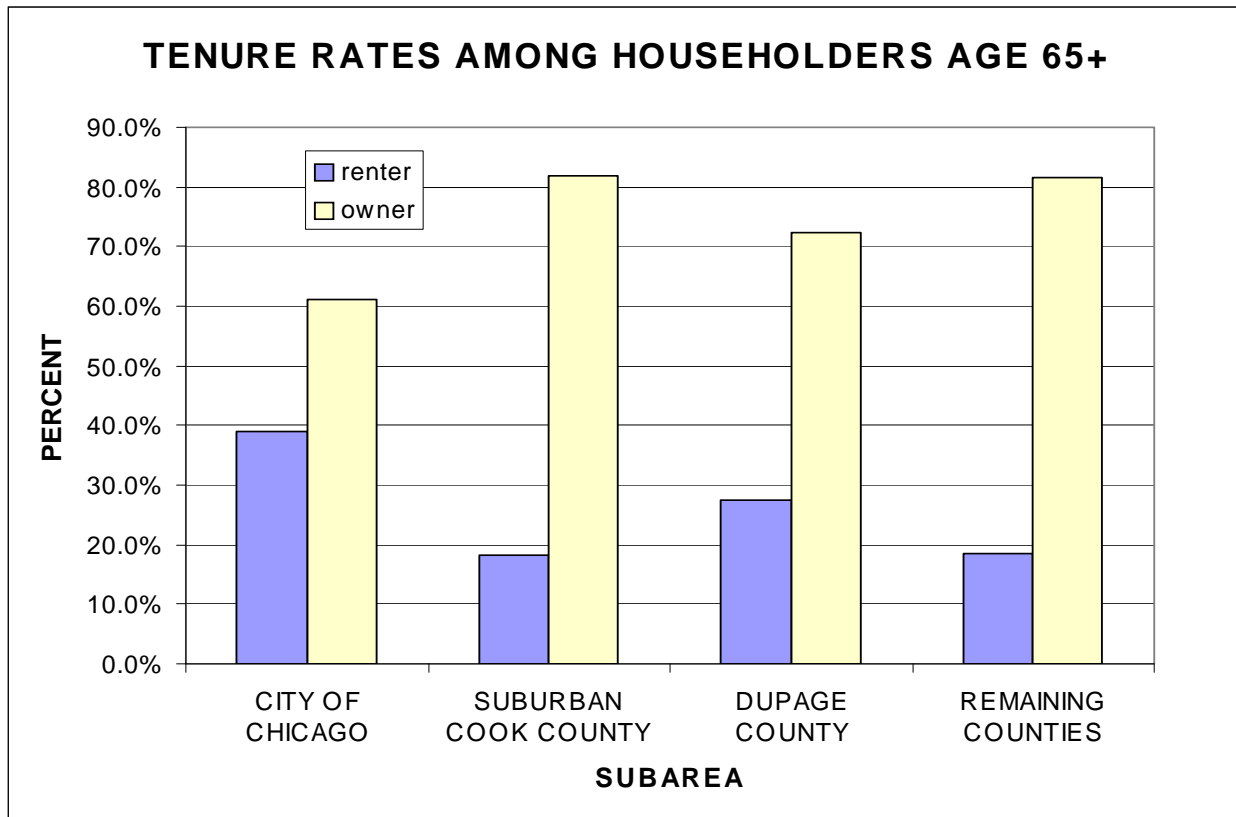


**Figure 25. Tenure rates among Householders age 65 or older by subarea, 1995**

**Figure 26. Proportion of Elderly householders that rent by subarea, 1995**



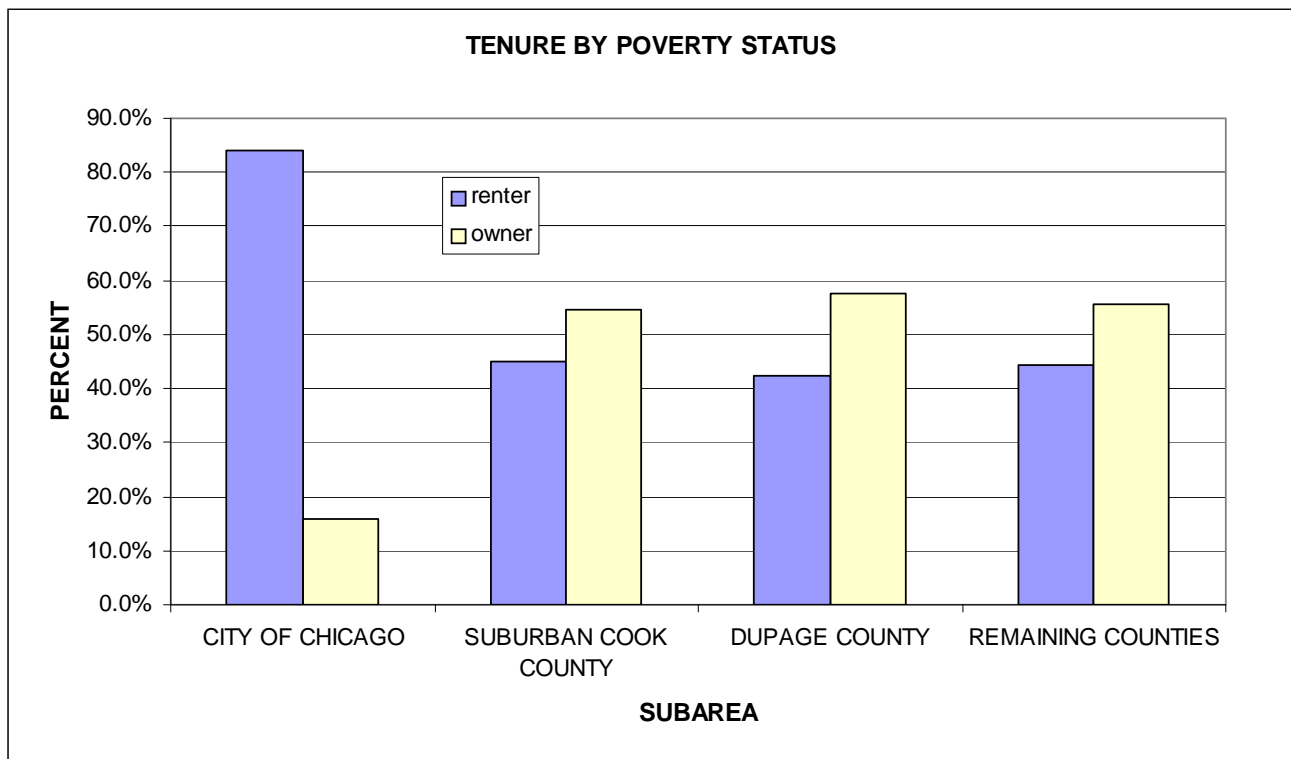


**Figure 27. Tenure by poverty status by subarea, 1995**

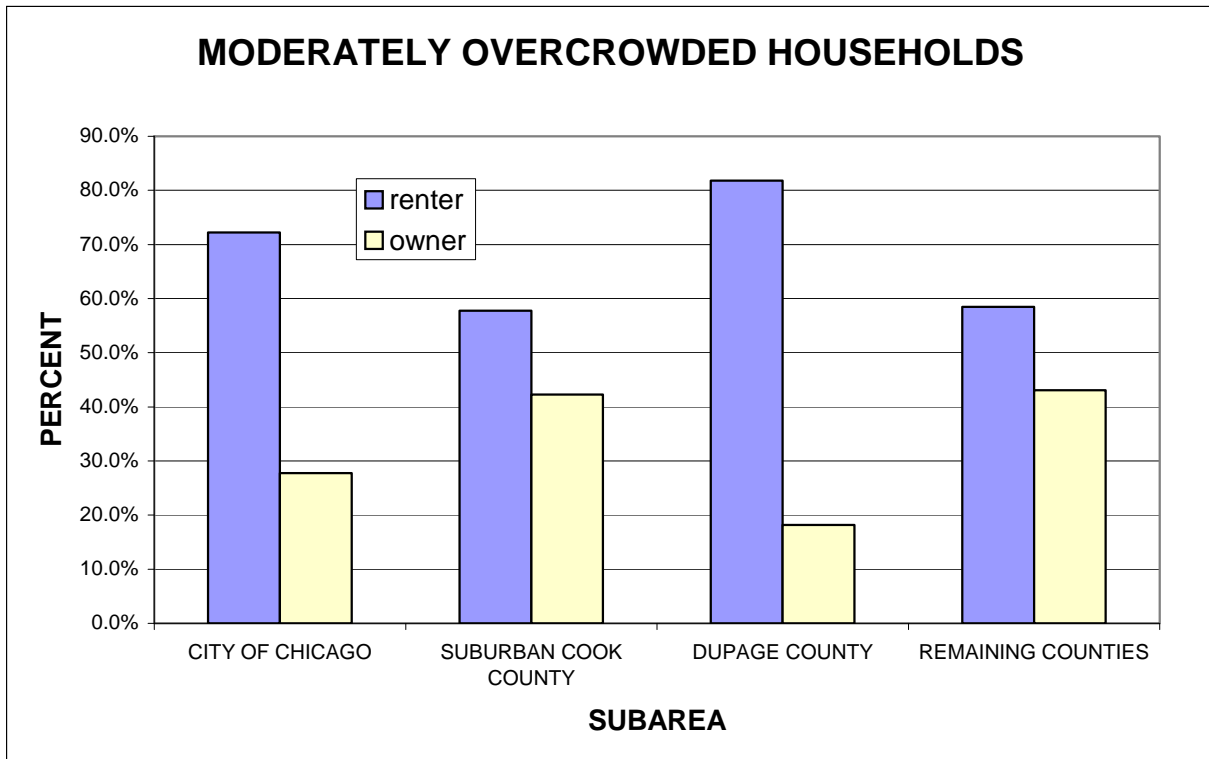

**B. REVIEW OF 1995-96 CONSOLIDATED PLANS'  
ESTIMATES OF HOMELESS PERSONS**

**CONSOLIDATED PLANS REVIEWED**  
(in alphabetical order)

**ARLINGTON HEIGHTS 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The 1990 Census enumerated **19 homeless persons on April 1, 1990**, with an estimated 90% of them staying in shelters. In **1994 PADS** served **630 persons**, of which **33 were from Arlington Heights**.

**AURORA 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Aurora lies in both Kane and DuPage Counties. A January 1994 point-in-time count of Aurora's shelters found **11 homeless families** (for a total of 36 people) and 211 homeless individuals. Of these persons, 16% were mentally ill, 59.5% had drug and/or alcohol problems, and 3.6% had both mental illness and drug and/or alcohol problems.<sup>1</sup>

**CHICAGO**

**1995 Consolidated Plan Executive Summary**

In Fiscal Year **1994**, Chicago funded shelter programs served greater than **18,000** clients.

**City of Chicago 1999 Action Plan**

According to this Plan, in 1998 Chicago received \$25 million under SuperNOFA, and in 1999 is due to receive \$32 million under it. Because Chicago has determined that family housing is a priority in 1999, many of the proposed programs for 1999 are for transitional and permanent housing for families.<sup>2</sup> No figures are given as to the size of the homeless population in Chicago; however, many programs estimate the size of the population that they will serve. Several examples follow.

## **CICERO 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

According to this summary, “homelessness is a minor problem in the community.”<sup>4</sup> A point-in-time survey identified **12 homeless persons in Cicero**.

## **1998 COOK COUNTY ANNUAL ACTION PLAN**

No figures as to the number of homeless persons are given in this report. In 1997 Cook County received a grant under HUD’s SuperNOFA (Notice of Funding Availability) for Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance for eight collaborative projects in the amount of \$3,735,367.<sup>5</sup>

## **DUPAGE COUNTY**

### **1995 Consolidated Plan Executive Summary**

This summary noted that very little information is available about the unsheltered homeless population in DuPage County. Of the homeless in shelters, almost 15% are under age 17, and 54% fall between the ages of 18 and 39.

### **1999 Action Plan**

The total amount of funding to meet homeless needs from CDBG and ESG is \$367,489. The money allocated to DuPage PADS is expected to benefit 1,240 persons.

## **ELGIN 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Elgin, in Kane County, reports that in February 1993 the average night occupancy of the two homeless service providers totaled 70, of whom 24 were children<sup>6</sup>

## **EVANSTON 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

No numbers as to the size of the homeless population were presented in this Plan. The Plan states: “The number of homeless persons in Evanston, including non-residents, is often a supply created demand. This means that as long as Evanston has a high quality homeless shelter which accepts persons regardless of their community of origin, and a strong public transportation system, homeless people will be drawn to Evanston.”<sup>7</sup>

## JOLIET 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Joliet, the largest city in Will County, estimated in this 1995 Plan that there were **2,023 homeless persons** in Joliet.

## LAKE COUNTY

### 1995-1999 CONSOLIDATED PLAN FOR LAKE COUNTY

The Plan stated that one service provider estimated that there were **62 homeless families per month in the County, and 54 single men and 19 single women** who were homeless.<sup>8</sup> For this Consolidated Plan, the County counted as homeless those who were precariously housed and at risk of becoming homeless as well as those without shelter. The Lake County Board of Health Advisory Board and Coordinating Council for Mental Health, Substance Abuse and Developmental Disabilities Services (AB/C Council) compiles statistics from homeless providers on a monthly basis, and according to its **March 1994 survey, there were 497 unduplicated homeless persons in Lake County**, of which 269 were in families (67 total families), and 228 were individuals.<sup>9</sup>

### Lake County 1998 Annual Action Plan

Lake County allocated over \$1,000, 000 for homeless services in this Plan: \$964,349 for transitional housing for the homeless, and \$108,000 for emergency shelter.<sup>10</sup>

## MCHENRY COUNTY

### Consolidated Housing and Community Development Plan for Fiscal Year 1995 Funds

This report uses numbers from PADS, a service provider in McHenry County, which operates shelters eight months of the year. The total number of guests for the six-month period from October 1994 through March 1995 was 157.<sup>11</sup> Additionally, two surveys' findings are reported. First, the *McHenry County Emergency Housing Survey—1993*, conducted by the Pioneer Center, found that:

- **95 – 100%** of all people requesting emergency housing assistance in 1993 were McHenry County residents.
- In 1993 McHenry County agencies spent at least **\$55,000** to house homeless people in motels.
- **1,850** requests for emergency housing assistance were received for a total of **4,700 people**.<sup>12</sup>

Second, *A Needs Assessment of People Seeking Emergency Housing Assistance, McHenry County, April 1993—March 1994* was prepared by the Woodstock Area Community Ministry. Thirteen agencies serving the homeless in McHenry County were interviewed. One question asked was whether clients need supportive services in addition to help with housing. Of the ten agencies responding, nine indicated that at least **75%** of their clients are in need of such services; seven of them indicated that 95% of their clients required these services.<sup>13</sup>

Figures from **PADS** showed a total of 202 homeless people, of which 39 were in families and 163 were individuals. PADS figures show 0 homeless individuals under 17 (but PADS does not serve that population), and 0 unsheltered homeless persons.<sup>14</sup>

### **McHenry County 1997 Annual Action Plan**

According to this Action Plan, “homeless assistance and the retainage/production of affordable housing continues to be the County’s number one community development priority.”<sup>15</sup>

According to the County’s Continuum of Care Strategy, an estimated **1,630 homeless families lived in McHenry County in 1995**. The McHenry County Housing Authority reported that 868 individuals in the County receive Section 8 benefits, but that because only 122 units of Section 8 assistance have been received in the past ten years, a waiting list of over 1000 households now exists for Section 8 housing. Further, the Housing Authority reported that 200 households have no permanent place to live and move from shelter to friends to PADS, while another 200 households are doubled up with family members.<sup>16</sup>

### **McHenry County 1999 Annual Action Plan**

McHenry County developed a Gaps Analysis Chart for this Plan, through which each agency serving the homeless identified gaps, and how the agencies’ projects would fill the gaps. No numbers are provided here as to the number of individuals identified.

This Action Plan also includes detailed population and housing charts.

## **MOUNT PROSPECT 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Although the **1990 Census** listed only **13 homeless persons in Mt. Prospect**, the Village Human Services Department estimated that there were approximately **500 homeless persons in the village in 1994**.<sup>17</sup>

## **NAPERVILLE 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Naperville in DuPage County reports that in 1992 **632** sheltered people were in all of DuPage County, while in the year ending September 30, 1994 there were **133** unduplicated homeless persons in Naperville.<sup>18</sup>

## **NORTH CHICAGO 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

No individual statistics were available for this city in Lake County.

## **OAK LAWN 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The 1990 Census listed **0 homeless persons** in Oak Lawn. **South Suburban PADS reported that approximately 342 homeless persons** from Oak Lawn received direct services.<sup>19</sup>

## **OAK PARK 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

According to this Summary, the **ESG program sheltered 314 individuals**; and a total of 240 households consisting of 327 individuals were referred to other shelters or agencies.<sup>20</sup>

## **SCHAUMBURG 1995 CONSOLIDATED PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In 1993 village organizations assisted 180 people. The racial/ethnic breakdown of the village homeless is 69% White, 7% Black, 8% Hispanic, and 16% Other race/Unspecified.<sup>21</sup>

## **WAUKEGAN**

### **1995-1999 Consolidated Plan**

The statistics that are presented are for all of Lake County, not just Waukegan, thus they are the same as those referred to in the Lake County section above.

## **WILL COUNTY**

### **Will County 1995 Consolidated Plan**

This Plan notes a great increase in demand for services for the homeless in Will County. The **total number of homeless persons** in Will County for the year October 1, 1993 through

September 30, 1994 was **1,126**. According to the **1990** U.S. Census, **the number of unsheltered homeless in the county was 0.** <sup>22</sup>

**Will County 1998 Action Plan**

This 1998 Plan allocates \$75,000 of the total \$1,856,000 in CDBG funds to Homeless Public Services. A Continuum of Care Gaps Analysis for both individuals and persons in families in children was conducted, with the following results.
